School Profile

Fesler Junior High School is located in the northeastern region of Santa Maria and serves students in grades seven through eight following a modified year-round calendar. At the beginning of the 2015-16 school year, 913 students were enrolled, including 5.7% in special education, 29.5% qualifying for English Language Learner support, and 88.6% qualifying for free or reduced price lunch.

Student Achievement

Physical Fitness

In the spring of each year, Fesler Junior High School is required by the state to administer a physical fitness test to all students in grade seven. The physical fitness test measures each student's ability to complete fitness tasks in six major areas. Students who either meet or exceed the standards in all six fitness areas are considered to be in the "healthy fitness zone." The chart provided in this document reports only the percentage in each category, not a cumulative total of the results for categories 4 of 6 and 5 of 6. Federal Intervention Program

The passage of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), reauthorizing the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) in December 2015, is part of the Federal Title I funding program designed to support additional staffing and programs to meet the needs of low-income, low achieving students, and other designated students with special needs. Schools may apply, based upon their student demographics, for one of two types of Title I funding: Title I Schoolwide or Title I Targeted Assistance. Title I Schoolwide schools use federal funds for schoolwide improvement of student achievement. Title I Targeted Assistance schools use federal funds to help those students who meet specific program criteria. In 2015-16, Fesler Junior High School qualified for Schoolwide Title I funding and is subject to comply with Title I program participation requirements.

Any school receiving Title I funds is required to comply with respective program testing and reporting activities, achieve specific levels of student proficiency, and monitor school progress towards meeting established goals. Most of the new provisions under ESSA do not take effect until the 2017-18 school year making 2016-17 a transition year. California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress

California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) Tests assess student performance in Science in grades five, eight and ten, and English language arts/literacy and Mathematics in grades 3 through 8 and 11 utilizing computer-adaptive tests and performance tasks. This system is based on the California State Standards and is part of the Smarter Balanced Assessment System.

The CAASPP results shown in this report include overall results comparing the school, district and state scores as well as the school's overall score in each applicable grade level and subgroup. Results are shown only for subgroups with ten students or more taking the exam. For those categories that are blank in the tables, no students met subgroup criteria. School Facilities & Maintenance

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Fesler Junior High School's original facilities were built in 1960; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority. In the last 12 months, the following improvements have been completed:

- Remediate site drainage issues (2015-16)
- Replace ramps on portables (2015-16)
- Addition of four portable classrooms (2016-17)

Every morning before school begins, the custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One day custodian and three evening custodians (two full-time and one part-time) are assigned to Fesler Junior High School. The day custodian is responsible for:

- Cafeteria setup/cleanup
- Restroom cleaning
- Work orders
- Site maintenance issues

Restrooms are checked throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodians are responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Cafeteria cleanup
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning
- Event setup/ take down

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

Deferred Maintenance

Fesler Junior High School participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provides dollar-for-dollar matching funds to assist school districts with major repairs or replacement of existing school building components. Deferred maintenance projects generally include roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior/exterior

painting, and floor systems. During the 2015-16 school year, Santa Maria-Bonita School District allocated \$600 of deferred maintenance funds for repairs at Fesler Junior High School.

Facilities Inspection

The district's maintenance department inspects Fesler Junior High School on an annual basis in accordance with Education Code §17592.72(c)(1). Fesler Junior High School uses a school site inspection survey to identify unsafe or hazardous conditions and facility improvement needs. The most recent school inspection took place on Sunday, September 18, 2016. No emergency repairs were needed and no unsafe conditions were found. During fiscal year 2015-16, all restrooms were fully functional and available for student use.

Exemplary: The school meets most or all standards of good repair. Deficiencies noted, if any, are not significant and/or impact a very small area of the school.

Campus Supervision

School administration and teaching staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. As students arrive on campus each morning, the principal, assistant principal, the dean of students, and counselors patrol the campus, entrance areas, and designated common areas. The principal, assistant principal, the dean of students, counselors, and noon aides monitor lunch time activity in the cafeteria and common student activity areas. At the end of the day when students are dismissed, the principal, assistant principal, the dean of students, and counselors monitor student behavior and ensure students either leave campus or travel to after school activities in a safe and orderly manner. To enhance two-way routine communication and facilitate an immediate response to urgent situations, the principal, assistant principal, custodians, the dean of students, and office staff carry hand-held radios while on campus.

Fesler Junior High School is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors must sign in at the school's office and wear identification badges while on school grounds.

School Site Safety Plan

The Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan was developed for Fesler Junior High School in collaboration with local agencies and the district office to fulfill Senate Bill 187 requirements. Components of this plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe arrival and departure from school, sexual harassment policy, and dress

code policy. The school's most recent school safety plan was reviewed, updated, and discussed with school staff in November 2016.

Classroom Environment

Discipline & Climate for Learning

Fesler Junior High School's discipline practices and behavior management strategies comply with approved board policies and are designed to create effective learning environments and minimize classroom disruptions. Progressive discipline is employed in the classroom for those students experiencing difficulty following school rules, and proactive measures are utilized for those demonstrating positive behavior. Disciplinary intervention is managed by school administrators in a fair, firm, and consistent manner based upon the nature of each situation.

Curriculum & Instruction

Staff Development

All training and curriculum development activities at Fesler Junior High School revolve around the California State Standards. During the 2015-16 school year, Fesler Junior High School held staff development training devoted to:

- Cornell Notetaking / Color Coding
- Critical Reading & Writing
- Language Arts Strategies for English Learners
- Math Strategies
- Student Agenda Book - Strategies for Implementation
- Schoolwide Writing Strategies
- Google Apps Training
- California State Standards

Decisions concerning selection of staff development activities are performed by all staff using tools such as teacher input and data analysis to determine the areas in which additional teacher training may enhance classroom instruction and increase student achievement levels. Fesler Junior High School supports ongoing professional growth throughout the year on early release days. Teachers meet in department level teams to conduct data analysis to identify areas of need. Teaching staff are provided the opportunity to participate in district-sponsored staff development workshops or training sessions as 1) a supplement to site-based staff development, 2) for reinforcement of or follow-up on previous training, or 3) follow up training for newly implemented programs/curricula.

During the 2015-16 school year, Fesler Junior High School's teachers attended the following workshops or events hosted by the Santa Maria-Bonita School District:

Fesler Junior High School offers support to new and veteran teachers through peer coaching and mentoring. Instructional aides are provided targeted training focused on teaching strategies and curriculum content. All staff are encouraged to attend professional workshops and conferences. Classified support staff receive job related training from department supervisors and district representatives.

Instructional Materials

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Fesler Junior High School are aligned to the California State Standards. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On Wednesday, September 14, 2016, the Santa Maria-Bonita School District's Board of Education held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Education adopted Resolution 16-05 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARC's the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2016-17 school year, Santa Maria-Bonita School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

Specialized Instruction

All curriculum and instruction are being aligned to the California State Standards approved by the State Board of Education. The instructional program is structured so that all students receive instruction appropriate to their learning level. Teachers use a variety of research-based instructional strategies and techniques using state-approved instructional materials to ensure academic success.

Students with special gifts and talents need more challenging curriculum and instruction. The Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) program is offered to students in grades 7 through 8 who have been identified as academically gifted through district-administered assessments. Students are placed in honors classes. Instruction is provided by teachers who are GATE Certified.

For students whose primary language is not English and who have limited English proficiency, Fesler Junior High School offers programs to help them acquire English as quickly as possible and prepare them to meet the state's academic content standards. English learners may be placed in an ELD (English Language Development) class in lieu of an elective and as a supplement to their core language arts class. Instruction focuses on reinforcement of class lessons, reading intervention, and targeted support in areas of need. All students receive English Language Development instruction as a supplement to their regular language arts instruction. Fesler Junior High School's

teachers utilize McMillan McGraw Hill's California Treasures series, a state-approved reading intervention program and textbook adoption. English learners are assessed annually using the CELDT exam (California English Language Development Test); results are used to evaluate student progress, intervention programs, and teaching strategies.

Fesler Junior High School's special education program is staffed by two Resource Specialist Program Teachers and one Language/Hearing Teacher in a self-contained class. Instruction is provided in the least restrictive environment and based on each student's Individual Education Plan (IEP). Students have access to a comprehensive curriculum and are mainstreamed into the general education class with small group and individualized instruction in the resource room. The IEP team meets annually to establish goals and objectives, define academic instruction, evaluate the effectiveness of the student's plan, and make instructional adjustments as necessary. Fesler Junior High School takes advantage of the district's participation in the Santa Barbara Special Education Local Plan Area, which provides a pool of professional resources and expertise in the field of special education.

Fesler Junior High School provides a variety of intervention and remediation programs to support students' efforts to achieve academic success and reach grade level expectations. Using formative assessments and summative assessments, teachers and administrators can identify students who are struggling or performing below state proficiency grade level standards. For those students who need extra help in any subject area, a Student Study Team pulls together school and family resources to identify and develop strategies to help students improve academic and/or behavioral performance. Intervention strategies include:

- ASES (After School Education and Safety)
- Tutoring (Lunchtime)
- Sustained Silent Reading Program
- After School Academies
- Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID)
- Group Counseling and Individual Counseling with MFT
- Migrant Educational Counselor

Supplementary instructional materials are purchased as needed to support intervention programs. Classroom teachers monitor student performance on district benchmark assessments, daily classwork, homework, and end-of-unit tests to measure ongoing academic progress and adjust instructional needs.

Professional Staff

Counseling & Support Staff

Fesler Junior High School provides professional, highly qualified staff that provide additional services and support centered on the whole student academically, physically, and mentally. The Counseling and Support Services table in this report illustrates the availability of non-instructional support staff to Fesler Junior High School's students. Full-time equivalent (FTE) is a standard measurement used to identify an employee's regular work load on a weekly basis. For example, an FTE of 1.0 designates a full-time position and the employee is on campus and available all day every day of the week; an FTE of 0.5 indicates that the staff member is available and on campus a portion (50%) of the week.

Teacher Assignment

During the 2015-16 school year, Fesler Junior High School had 38 teachers who met all credential requirements in accordance with state guidelines. The Federal No Child Left Behind Act requires that all teachers in core subject areas meet certain requirements in order to be considered as "NCLB Compliant." Minimum qualifications include: possession of a bachelor's degree, possession of an appropriate California teaching credential, and demonstrated competence in core academic subjects. In the table below, which identifies the number of classrooms taught by NCLB-compliant and non-compliant teachers, high poverty schools are those schools in the highest quartile for student participation defined by the free and reduced price meal program. Low poverty schools are those schools that are in the lowest quartile of program participation.

Expenditures Per Student

For the 2014-15 school year, Santa Maria-Bonita School District spent an average of \$9,101 of total general funds to educate each student (based on 2014-15 audited financial statements and in accordance with calculations defined in Education Code §41372).
